

2019 Graduation

On Wednesday 11th December 2019, Campion College celebrated its 12th Graduation Mass and Ceremony, at St Patrick's Cathedral in Parramatta.

We were honoured by the presence of two distinguished guests: Very Reverend Anthony Percy, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Canberra and Goulburn and Professor of Bioethics Margaret Somerville of the University of Notre Dame Australia.

Very Rev Percy celebrated the Mass and gave a stirring homily on the importance of the two great "lights" that human beings are gifted with: faith and reason. He used the Prophet Isaiah (40) as his "bouncing board":

Young men may grow tired and weary, youths may stumble, but those who hope in the Lord renew their strength, they put out wings like eagles. They run and do not grow weary, walk and never tire.

And may you remain, throughout long, intellectually, emotionally and spiritually rich personal and professional lives, the very best examples of ethical lemmings. Be not afraid. Be brave. The Valedictory Address was given by outgoing Campion College Student Association President, Rainier Juanta, who reflected on the intellectual and spiritual benefits of his time at Campion. "Campion is a strange place to the rest of the world. But it is also strange in the best of ways. Because nowhere else can you find a group of people like our year, who embrace their strangeness." In his speech, Rainier explained what he meant by this "strangeness" during his Valedictory Speech. "It is strange to think that these people braved the wind and the rain for hours to stand up for the unborn; they cut short those precious hours of sleep and missed out on lunch to visit our Lord in the chapel. In Prof Somerville's opening address she said, "It's customary for speakers at graduations to try to communicate to graduates some words of wisdom that they will treasure, and I mused on what they might be." Prof Somerville went on to speak about choosing our area of work, transcendence, cynicism, hope, obligations to future generations, lemmings, science and religion. She concluded saying, "So, to sum up, my one piece of advice to you, today, as you leave your alma mater, Campion College: It is that in making decisions which will affect your life you should give much weight to considerations of where you are most likely to find meaning, experience transcendence - the feeling of belonging to something bigger than just yourself - and encounter amazement, wonder and awe. This is a wonderful day for you and your families and friends – may you celebrate it

The 2019 graduating class included 28 graduates and five diplomates. Additionally, two students: Simon-Pieter Doodeman and Cecilia Kent, received the Degree of Bachelor of Arts in the Liberal Arts and also the Diploma of Classical Languages.

This year the college medal, Campion's highest academic achievement, was awarded to Brianna McKee. Her average mark was 90.

Campion President Dr Paul Morrissey thanked the families and friends of the graduates for supporting them on such an important occasion. "Graduation is always a wonderful and moving occasion, and I want to thank all the families and friends for making the time to come and show their support for our graduates, not just at Wednesday's ceremony, but throughout their years of study at Campion."

The day ended with an afternoon tea with family and

friends celebrating the students' graduation.



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RE Certificate Available Now at Campion

We are excited to announce that we have launched a Graduate Certificate in Religious Education (Primary). It is designed to serve a dual purpose:

- a) as a foundation for university graduates seeking a qualification in theology who do not have any prior qualifications in this field.
- b) as professional development for teachers currently working in primary schools.

This marks Campion College's first post-graduate program of study. *The units are:*

RED501: Historical Context of Catholic Teaching

This unit of study traces the historical development of Catholic life and teaching and explores how this can be presented to students at various levels.

RED502: Catechesis in Sacramental Theology

Students completing this unit will develop a body of knowledge related to the education in sacramentality and sacraments of students in primary schools.

RED503: Challenges and Strategies in Religious Education

Students completing this unit will explore developmental theory and curriculum principles applicable to the religious education of students.

RED504: Introduction to Biblical Studies

Students completing this unit will develop a body of knowledge related to the Bible and its interpretation according to the Catholic Tradition.

Please note, RED502 and RED503 will be offered in 2020. RED501 and RED504 will be on offer in 2021.

Mode of Delivery: Lectures and Discussion sessions are all online. Lectures are asynchronous. Discussion sessions are synchronous.

Students completing this course will have a body of knowledge related to theological studies. They will be equipped to undertake professional work related to their specialisation, and use it as a basis for further learning.
