CATHOLIC LEARNING IN THE LIBERAL ARTS

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Campion the *Number 1 BA in Australia* Four Years in a Row



Australia's first liberal arts college has held its place as the country's number one Bachelor of Arts degree provider for four years running.

Campion College, based in Western Sydney, scored an impressive 96.9 per cent on Quality of Entire Educational Experience in the 2019-2020 nationwide Student Experience Survey, conducted by the federal government's Quality Indicators for Learning and Teaching (QILT).

Campion not only remains the top BA in the country for quality of educational experience – more than 10 percentage points higher than the highest-rated university – it also retained its number one spot for Learner Engagement in Australia at 95.9 per cent.

Campion additionally held its place in the top 10 institutions across all of QILT's measures, attaining third place overall for Quality of Experience, Teaching Quality, Skills Development and Student Support.

Campion president Dr Paul Morrissey said he was extremely proud of the college's achievement, pointing to Campion's commitment to intimate class sizes and face-to-face learning for its success. "At Campion we believe that a degree should be a formative experience, in which you don't merely learn facts, figures or theories, but rather to assess them critically, question them, and discuss and debate them both in class and out," Dr Morrissey said.

"In short, we believe in teaching our students not what to think, but how to think."

While moving to online classes for the first time in the first semester of 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions, face-to-face classes returned in August, and have continued in 2021.

"We're very fortunate to have a smaller student body, as it means we've been able to bring all our students back onto campus, with safety protocols in place," Dr Morrissey said.

"So much of the Campion experience is the community, the small class sizes, as well as easy access to the lecturers, and which we believe has contributed to our place as the number one institution for Learner Engagement."

Campion offers a three-year Bachelor of Arts in the Liberal Arts, focusing on four key disciplines: history, literature, philosophy and theology, with optional units in science, mathematics, Classical Latin and Greek.



Matriculation

Campion College commenced the academic year on 1st March 2021 with our annual Matriculation Mass, Ceremony and BBQ. The Mass was celebrated by the college's first graduate, who was recently ordained as a priest, Fr Reginald Chua. He was joined by Campion chaplain Fr Peter Kruk and theology lecturer Rev Dr Luke Holohan.

Following Mass, which was held outdoors for the first time, Dr Paul Morrissey thanked Fr Chua and welcomed the 34 students, who signed their names into Campion's Matriculation Book.

Dating back to the Middle Ages, the Matriculation ceremony is held to officially welcome new students as members of a university.

Based on a Medieval model of study, Campion holds a Matriculation ceremony every year, in which students are given academic gowns, to be worn at formal events throughout the academic year.

After the official ceremonies were over, a barbecue lunch was held for everyone on campus before students went to class for the first afternoon lectures of the semester.



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Student Retreat

Campion's annual student retreat took place the weekend of 12th to 14th March at the Benedict XVI Retreat Centre in Grose Vale, northwest of Sydney.

The retreat focused on evangelisation under the theme, 'We are called to share the Gospel'.

Guest priest Fr Suresh Kumar spoke on Friday night about his conversion from Islam to Christianity, and then his journey to the priesthood. He was followed on Saturday by Sr Therese Mills of the Missionaries of God's Love. Both talks delved into the theme of evangelisation and conversion.

The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine wrapped up the retreat on Sunday with a talk about Catholic missionary work.

The retreat, run by Campion chaplain Fr Peter Kruk, allowed the students plenty of time for prayer, reflection and recreation, as well as all-night adoration, and confessions.

A highlight of the retreat was the talent show, in which students took to the stage to perform for their peers.



Active Listening

On Wednesday 10th of March, resident counsellor Scott Carrol (Catholic Care) and Campion College Student Association President Campbell Evans ran a lunchtime workshop equipping students with the processes and language of "active listening".

"Australians have a tendency to remain uneducated when it comes to mental health processes!" said Campbell.

"This becomes explicit in our culture of asking 'How you goin' mate?' with no intention of actually hearing the answer!"

RE Certificate

Following on from a successful launch in Semester 1 2020, Campion is pleased to report sustained interest and growing enrolments in our Graduate Certificate in Religious Education (Primary).

Developed with the expertise of Professor Gerard O'Shea, the 100% online course continues to have broad appeal with a surge in new enrolments from teachers in the Archdiocese of Hobart this semester and expressions of interest from teachers as far as Perth already coming through for our Semester 2 intake.

The Grad Cert consists of four compulsory units of study:

- **RED501:** Historical Context of Catholic Teaching
- **RED502:** Catechesis in Sacramental Theology
- **RED503:** Challenges and Strategies in Religious Education
- RED504: Introduction to Biblical Studies

A typical student will enrol in one unit per semester to best balance their study with full-time work, taking them two years to complete the course. Though it is possible to complete the Grad Cert in one year.

Semester 2 commences on Monday 1st August with applications for this intake closing on Wednesday 28th July. Library in Focus: *The World of Edmund Campion*

The Campion library's special collection, the 'World of Edmund Campion' contains over 700 volumes covering the period of Recusant Catholicism from the Reformation up to the mid-19th century. The collection is named after St Edmund Campion, a 16th century Oxford scholar and martyr, and provides a wealth of background material on Edmund Campion's era and the Catholic Church in England.

There are many interesting and unusual works within the collection but of special note is the set of Catholic Record Society volumes. Established in 1904, The Catholic Record Society (CRS) sought to create access to material and records needed for the study of Roman Catholic history in England and Wales. The society published content from a wide range of sources such as records, letters, diaries, registers, and chronicles from the time of the Reformation and beyond. CRS also publishes a series of monographs which are available in the Edmund Campion Collection.

As well as the records and monographs, the CRS publishes a journal originally titled Biographical Studies 1534-1829, then renamed in 1954 to Recusant History, and finally renamed British Catholic History in 2015. The journal is published by Cambridge University Press and
