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### Campion a 'pearl in the desert' says Cardinal

Cardinal George Pell described Campion College as a "pearl" in the educational desert of Australia in a speech at Campion's Capital Appeal fundraiser on 17 August 2022.

The keynote address, given at Parliament House in Sydney, gave a frank assessment of the political, cultural and educational landscape in the country, concluding that we live in a fraying society.

"The brutal forces driving evolution, the law of the jungle, the economic and intellectual inequalities among humans, the differences between the strong and the weak, the sick and the healthy, all fly in the face of any claims of universal human dignity," Cardinal Pell said.

"Already a significant section explicitly endorses tribalism, revenge, raw power and domination rather than any movement to consensus; in a hostile post-Christian Australia sustaining the liberalism ideal might be as difficult as planting democracy in Iraq or Afghanistan."

The former Archbishop of Sydney said there was still hope, however, and that he did not believe "that the field has been lost"

"We hope and work for peace, but if the worst was to happen ... present high levels of rhetoric would then be of absolutely no use. Deeds are needed, not words."

He described Campion as a "bright example" of positive change against the loss of cultural stability in Australia, which has negatively affected education, in particular:

"Campion studies history through Christian spectacles, evaluating the right and wrong, the good and evil, rejects any notion of a whitewash and works to diminish prejudice. But it inculcates a love and pride in our tradition, just as we love our families while recognising their failures," he said.

"Students are introduced to the wisdom of the ages through our tradition, the Western tradition. They learn of the central virtues, about faith and reason, about the search for meaning.

"Because this education is good for individuals, it follows that it is good for society. Much of what Campion College now strives to do was done 100 or even 50 years ago for the elite and the battlers by family, school, church, university and even much of the media. No longer."

The Cardinal concluded, "Campion has joined the fray and is contributing steadily. It is a pearl in the desert. I congratulate the College's founders, for their vision and perseverance as I commend the work of (President) Dr Paul Morrissey and his staff and students."

Cardinal Pell's remarks were echoed by Campion student Ashleigh Mills, in her third and final year of the undergraduate degree, who said "Campion fosters an environment of deeply thoughtful people. It's a place where lots of questions are encouraged, and students don't feel like they have to 'toe the line' on a certain ideology in order to be heard".

"Campion has encouraged me to see education not simply as a ticket to a job, but as a foundation for growth in my whole person, encompassing both knowledge and virtue as well as practical skills that together form a more mature and well-rounded "habit of mind" which lasts through life, to quote John Henry



Newman," Ashleigh said.

Guests also heard from Sydney Archbishop Anthony Fisher, former Prime Minister John Howard and founding Director of Campion, James Power, with the event hosted by journalist Jo Hayes as Master of Ceremonies.

Campion graduates Emelina Phillips and Bethany Marsh entertained guests with a moving performance of Italian art song "Amarilli Mia Bella" and "She Never Told Her Love" by Joseph Haydn.

The night ended with a final vote of thanks from Dr Paul Morrissey.

The fundraiser was held in aid of Campion's Capital Appeal Campaign, to build a new academic wing to cater for more students, including a library, lecture theatre, classrooms, study spaces and an underground carpark, as well as four additional residential houses.

# **Solution Short course Short course**


Campion College Australia has launched a short online course on Western Civilisation.

The pre-recorded lecture series covers topics in the history, philosophy, theology and literature of Western Civilisation, derived from Campion's top-rated Liberal Arts degree, and is designed to be taken at the student's pace.

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#### Former Campion Chairman Awarded In Queen's Birthday Honours List

Campion College board member and former Chairman Joseph de Bruyn was awarded the title AO in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

Mr de Bruyn served as Chairman of the Campion Institute Board for 17 years, officiating at every graduation ceremony until 2021, when he stepped down as Chairman but remaining on the Board. Mr de Bruyn, who was National President of the Shop Distributive and Allied Employees Association and Senior Vice-President of the Australian Council of Trade Unions, was given the honour for "distinguished"

service to industrial relations, particularly the trade union sector, for superannuation reform, and to higher education".

Campion President Dr Paul Morrissey congratulated Mr de Bruyn on his achievement on behalf of the college, saying no-one was more worthy of this honour.

"Joe is a real tour de force and has worked tirelessly for his fellow Australians, especially in education and the labour force," Dr Morrissey said.

"Apart from being an integral supporter of Campion College and the liberal arts in Australia, Joe has also been a great defender of authentic Catholic social teaching, and I'm so pleased to see his hard work and his achievements recognised by his country and Head of State."

It was a day of accolades for Campion College, as former Board member Anna Krohn received an OAM for services to the Catholic Church, and honorary fellow John Anderson received an AC for eminent service to rural development, leadership in international agricultural research, to social commentary and through contributions to not-for-profit organisations.

### Surviving 'Rat Of Tobruk' Dennis Davis Tells His Story

One of the last surviving 'Rats of Tobruk', Dennis Davis, visited Campion to give his testimony.

The World War II veteran is one of an estimated eight remaining Australian-led Allied soldiers that held the Libyan port of Tobruk for eight months in 1941.

Mr Davis is also great-grandfather of one of Campion's students, who invited him to speak about his life, including his harrowing time bunkered down during the siege.

As a member of the 9th division, Mr Davis defended the port alongside 14,000 other Australians and allied troops. He described how his division was initially stationed there for two months, but the



siege ended up extending to eight months. "It was the longest siege ever in British military history," he said. "Up to this stage, everything [the Germans] attempted, they'd succeeded, and it was here in Tobruk that they were first defeated."

Mr Davis also described the toll the war took on his relationship with his fiancée Margaret, who broke off the engagement as a result. Emotion took over as he described his reunion with her in Sydney while on leave. Their engagement renewed, they were married just six days later!

Mr Davis also said his Catholic faith was one of the major things that got him through this difficult period of his life and is a daily Mass-goer to this day.

We'd like to thank the Davis family and students Lucy Woodbury and Simeon Casey for organising this memorable

event. Dennis passed away peacefully on the 18 August. May his soul rest in peace.

## Campion to offer Honours course in 2023

## Campion College has added a major boost to its academic program with the establishment of an Honours course.

We are happy to announce we have received accreditation to teach the course *Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Arts* (*Honours*), allowing current students to extend their degree by a fourth year, while opening the door for external undergraduates to complete their studies at Campion.

President Dr Paul Morrissey said he was delighted to see the much-anticipated program come to fruition.

"This is a momentous occasion in Campion's history, and now that the accreditation process is complete, we hope this will give students the opportunity to dig deeper into the liberal arts offered at Campion," he said.

The Honours program will offer undergraduates the chance to specialise in one of Campion's four core

disciplines: history, theology, philosophy or literature.

"This course is designed to be taken by students who have majored in one of Campion's main disciplines, whether they have completed their bachelor degree at Campion or elsewhere," Dr Morrissey said.

"While we are thrilled to offer this opportunity to our liberal arts students, we are also excited to welcome new students who may wish to take advantage of Campion's dedicated and exceptional academics, its specialised focus on the liberal arts or even our close-knit community of learning."

Campion's liberal arts bachelor degree has been consistently rated the number one degree in Australia according to the national Student Experience Survey, topping every BA provider in the country. The Honours program, now the highest level of study attainable in the undergraduate degree at Campion, will be divided equally into coursework and a research thesis of 15,000-18,000 words.

It will also open pathways to more advanced, postgraduate study at other higher education providers in the humanities, as well as vocational postgraduate courses, such as teaching and law.

Undergraduates who will complete their bachelor degree by the end of this year, and fulfil all application requirements, will be eligible to undertake the Honours program from Semester 1, 2023. To learn more:
