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Naming of the McClellan Lecture Hall

Campion College proudly celebrated the official naming of the **McClellan Lecture Hall** on Thursday, 21 May honouring Tony and Rae McClellan for their extraordinary generosity, steadfast leadership, and lifelong commitment to Christian education and philanthropy.

In his opening address, President Dr Paul Morrissey reflected on the significance of the occasion, acknowledging Tony and Rae's remarkable impact on Campion and Australian public life. Throughout the evening, speakers paid tribute to the couple's distinguished record of business leadership, philanthropy, and support for educational and humanitarian initiatives in Australia and abroad.

Scott McClellan spoke movingly about the purpose behind the family's philanthropy, reminding guests that generosity creates a legacy far beyond those who give.

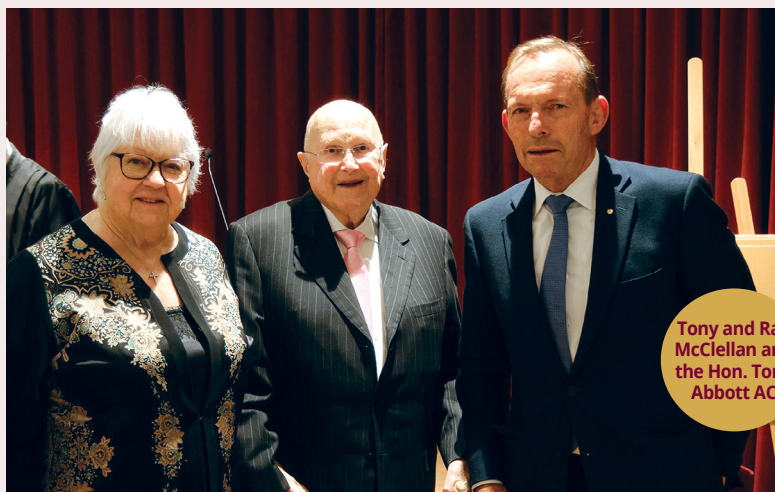

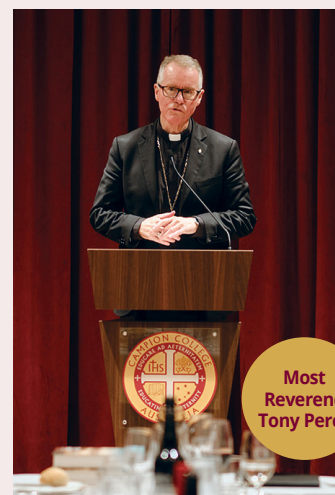

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Annual St Edmund Campion Lecture: *Professor Simon Haines on the Enduring Power of Books*

Campion College welcomed students, staff, trustees and friends to its Annual St Edmund Campion Mass, Dinner and Lecture on the 18 of June 2026, with Distinguished Professor of Liberal Arts, Simon Haines delivering a thoughtful address on the formative power of books, reading and attention in an age of distraction.

In a thought provoking address, Professor Haines explored the enduring importance of books, reading and attentive thought in an increasingly distracted world. Opening with John Donne's reflection that "No man is an island," he suggested that each person's life forms part of a larger "book of humanity" and that reading the great works of the past remains one of the richest ways to encounter the human story.

Drawing on personal memories of learning to read and his early experiences reading Scripture aloud as a schoolboy, Professor Haines reflected on how careful, patient reading shapes both intellectual and personal development. He argued that great texts reveal their meaning over time, rewarding sustained attention and thoughtful engagement.

Referencing contemporary research in neuroscience and cognitive science, Professor Haines highlighted the cognitive benefits of reading, including stronger attention, empathy and vocabulary. In an age where digital technologies often fragment concentration, he emphasised that deep reading is an increasingly valuable intellectual discipline.

Professor Haines also spoke about the formation that comes through a liberal arts education. Engaging seriously with great books, he said, cultivates patience, humility, sound judgement and wisdom, enabling readers to better understand themselves and the wider human community.

Addressing the rise of artificial intelligence, he acknowledged its potential while cautioning against overreliance on technologies that may diminish independent thinking. By contrast, he argued, the disciplined reading of substantial texts remains a practice of intellectual freedom and active engagement.

Concluding with the thought of philosopher Simone Weil, Professor Haines described attention as an act of generosity directed towards truth. He praised Campion College for fostering a culture of serious reading and intellectual conversation, reminding guests that the great books of the Western tradition remain an inexhaustible treasure, inviting every generation into a deeper understanding of truth, humanity and the common good.



Maurice O'Shannassy Explores Economics, Science and the Search for Truth



On Thursday 4 June, students, staff and guests gathered at Campion College for a lecture by economist and former fund manager, Maurice O'Shannassy, who explored two subjects that have long informed his professional and intellectual pursuits: the foundations of modern economics and the relationship between science and belief in God.

Drawing on a distinguished career in global finance and investment, Mr O'Shannassy reflected on how his interest in economic theory developed during his early years at the Australian Treasury. Revisiting major historical events, including the collapse of the Soviet Union, the Asian financial crisis and the Global Financial Crisis, he explained how these experiences led him to question many of the assumptions underpinning contemporary economic thought.

Mr O'Shannassy also spoke about his ongoing work on a multi-volume study of economics, finance and banking, which examines the evolution of monetary systems, the operation of modern financial institutions and the development of economic theory over time.

The second half of the lecture shifted to the relationship between science and faith. Drawing on decades of reading across mathematics, biology, physics and philosophy, Mr O'Shannassy argued that scientific inquiry not only deepens our understanding of the natural world but also raises profound questions about the nature of reality, the origins of life and the existence of God.

The evening concluded with a lively question and answer session, during which students engaged Mr O'Shannassy on a range of contemporary issues, including free markets, government debt, cryptocurrency and the future of the global financial system.

Campion College is located on a campus in Sydney's west, at 8-14 Austin Woodbury Place, Toongabbie. The property was originally a Marist Fathers' Seminary and was bought some years ago by the Diocese of Parramatta. It was later purchased by the **Campion Foundation**.

The campus comprises 10 acres of wooded land, surrounded by a residential estate but sufficiently detached and tranquil for the purpose of nurturing spiritual and intellectual life. The property is adjacent to public transport routes and major freeways with the historic city of Parramatta just 10 minutes away, offering an array of services as well as cultural and entertainment opportunities. Sydney CBD is approximately 30km from the college and the Blue Mountains are easily accessible via car or train.

Our free tours generally take 30-60 minutes and are conducted by our Future Students Advisor. During your tour, you will explore the main building, the Gina Rinehart Library, the George Cardinal Pell Grand Hall, lecture theatres, classrooms, chapel and accommodation areas.
